### NATIONAL DOCTRINE AND REPORTS

#### *National Preparedness Goal*

The National Preparedness Goal, released in September 2011, defines what it means for the whole community to be prepared for all types of disasters and emergencies. The goal itself is succinct: “A secure and resilient nation with the capabilities required across the whole community to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk.”

#### *National Incident Management System (NIMS)*

NIMS provides a consistent, nationwide approach for multiple agencies or jurisdictions to work together to build, sustain, and deliver the core capabilities needed to achieve a secure and resilient Nation. NIMS identifies concepts, principles, and vocabulary which coordinate the management, from preparedness to recovery, of all incidents regardless of their cause, size, location, or complexity.

#### *NIMS Resource Management*

Emergency management and incident response activities require carefully managed resources (personnel, teams, facilities, equipment, and/or supplies) to meet incident needs. Utilization of the standardized resource management concepts such as typing, inventorying, organizing, and tracking will facilitate the dispatch, deployment, and recovery of resources before, during, and after an incident.

- *Resource Typing Library Tool (RTLTL)*

The RTLTL is the online catalog of all NIMS resource typing definitions and job titles/position qualifications that have been released by FEMA as final publication or interim guidance. Definitions and job titles/position qualifications are easily searchable and discoverable through the RTLTL. They can be viewed directly on the Web page, downloaded in PDF format, or directly used by third party software applications using the available Web Services application programming interface (API).

- ***Incident Resource Inventory System (IRIS)***

IRIS is a distributed software tool, provided at no-cost by FEMA. It is standards-based and allows for the seamless exchange of information with other instances of IRIS and with other standards-based resource inventory and resource management systems. IRIS allows users to identify and inventory their resources, consistently with NIMS resource typing definitions, for mutual aid operations based on mission needs and each resource's capabilities, availability, and response time, and share information with other agencies.

## ***Technical Assistance (TA) Program***

The FEMA TA Program improves national preparedness by partnering with local, state, tribal, and territorial jurisdictions to support their emergency management programs across the five mission areas (Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response, Recovery), and Homeland Security program management. The TA Program offers technical expertise, guidance, tools, templates and examples, and other resources on a range of preparedness and program management topics, depending on the jurisdiction's or organization's needs.

## DATA TOOLS AND RESOURCES

### *Strategic Foresight Research and Reports*

The world is changing in ways that may significantly impact the emergency management community. Thinking more broadly and over a longer time frame helps FEMA and its partners understand trends that may influence our mission space. This type of analysis, known as “strategic foresight,” enables us to better understand and anticipate risks and take advantage of opportunities in FEMA strategy, resource planning, and doctrine.

Under the Strategic Foresight Initiative (SFI) launched in 2010, FEMA worked with emergency management professionals across the Nation, to share resources, learn from, and highlight innovative efforts from the community to anticipate and address future challenges and opportunities.

### *FEMA Data Visualization*

FEMA launched a new data visualization tool that enables users to see when and where disaster declarations have occurred across the country. The tool helps provide important information about the history of disasters in local communities and what residents can do to prepare.

### *Risk Mapping, Assessment and Planning (Risk MAP)*

Risk MAP provides high-quality flood maps and information, tools to better assess the risk from flooding and planning, and outreach support to communities to help them take action to reduce (or mitigate) flood risk. Each Risk MAP flood risk project is tailored to the needs of each community and may involve different products and services.

*Census Bureau's OnTheMap:* The OnTheMap application provides access to workforce and demographic statistics for emergency preparedness, response and recovery activities. The application automatically incorporates real-time data updates from the National Weather Service's National Hurricane Center, Department of Interior, Department of Agriculture, and FEMA.

### *National Climate Assessment*

The National Climate Assessment summarizes the impacts of climate change on the United States, now and in the future. The Highlights provide a concise version of the full report including an Overview, select evidence for the 12 Report Findings, and summaries of the impacts of climate change on every region of the

United States. The full report of the National Climate Assessment provides an in-depth look at climate change impacts on the U.S. It details the multitude of ways climate change is already affecting and will increasingly affect the lives of Americans.

### ***U.S. Climate Resilience Toolkit***

The U.S. Climate Resilience Toolkit provides tools, information, and scientific expertise to help communities and businesses build resilience to climate-related impacts and extreme events. The toolkit includes a catalog of freely available tools for accessing and analyzing climate data, generating visualizations, exploring climate projections, estimating hazards, engaging stakeholders in resilience-building efforts, and locating regional climate scientists. It includes mapping/modeling data sets for: coastal flooding, ecosystem vulnerability, and food resilience.
